ABOUT THE BOOK

MONDAY MOOD BLUES

In Judy Moody: In a Monday Mood, Judy wakes up wishing it were Saturday instead of Monday. In fact, the author, Megan McDonald, used the simile "Mondays were like a punch in the arm" (page 1) to describe how Judy felt about them. Talk to your class about how a simile is a figure of speech that

compares two things using "like" or "as" in a fun and imaginative way. Have students go back through the book to find more similes, and then ask them to write their own about anything that has to do with Judy Moody or reading in general.



CLASS RAINBOW

Before Bubble Wrap Appreciation Day, Mr. Todd had a bulletin board that said "TOGETHER WE MAKE A RAINBOW" and was decorated with colorful paper crayons that had everybody from Class 3T's names on them. Make a version of this bulletin board to celebrate your class. Start off by talking to your students about what it means to be colorful and unique while they draw a crayon and put their name on it. Ask them to write words and phrases that describe their talents, things they like, how they feel, and what makes them special on it. Then have them color it in with whatever colors and patterns they'd like and cut it out. Invite students to share their finished product with the class before adding it to the bulletin board.

CLASS EGG DROP

Hold a class egg drop of your own by giving students eggs, tape, and Bubble Wrap to conduct a science experiment that tests how the Bubble Wrap can prevent eggs from breaking. In addition to being F-U-N, this experiment teaches them important physics concepts like gravity, motion, and momentum. First, have kids wrap their eggs in Bubble Wrap; then have them drop their eggs from three different heights to see if the Bubble Wrap protects the eggs. Before they do each drop, ask them to make predictions on what will happen. After each drop, have them record the results and share them with the class.

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WACKY HOLIDAY CELEBRATIONS

Judy Moody adores Mr. Todd's wacky calendar that shows a crazy holiday for every day of the year. Some of her favorites are National Sneak Some Zucchini onto Your Neighbor's Porch Day, Feed the Birds Day, National Eat Ice Cream for Breakfast Day, and Dress Up a Vegetable Day. Have your students research crazy holidays, each choose one to learn more about, and come up with a way to celebrate it. Hold a class party where kids take turns telling the class what they learned about their silly holiday



and leading everyone in a way to observe it.

ADJECTIVE NINJAS

Megan McDonald uses tons of RARE and awesome adjectives in her Judy Moody books. Adjectives give books details and help make them more fun and exciting to read. Ask students to come up with a list of at least ten adjectives. Then, using inspiration from Judy Moody: In a



Monday Mood, have them write and illustrate short stories with the title *The Adventures of Zucchini Ninja and Ninja Squirrel* and incorporate their adjectives. Publish the stories in a class anthology.

PEACE DAY

The Purple Hat Lady inspires Judy Moody and her friends to celebrate National Wear Purple for Peace Day. Hold a Peace Day at your school by encouraging students to wear purple clothing and creating things to promote and learn about peace. Before the celebration, have students research the need for peace in different parts of the world. Then have them write an informative essay on why peace is needed in one of the places they researched. Kick off the celebration by having kids read their



essays aloud before visiting stations with peace-promoting activities, like painting rocks and shells for a peace garden, making posters and collages that inform others about the need for peace around the world, and decorating yard signs with slogans that encourage peace and tolerance.
